A leading artist in the US during the middle years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Sepeshy is best known for his energetic realism of cityscapes and industrial landscapes. His work has been valued for expressing insights into the American life and culture that he claimed as his adopted home.

This egg tempera mural *Hauling in the Net* was commissioned by the federal government through FDR's New Deal. It has been displayed with the collections of the Beaver Island Historical Society for more than 50 years. It is an illustrative cornerstone of the island's commercial fishing and a significant piece of national history that cannot be replaced.
